MINUTES OF SEPTEMBER 13, 1999 were approved as written on MOTION by Donna Brizee. Affirmative vote was unanimous.

TREASURER'S REPORT: The Treasurer's Report was approved on MOTION by Dr. Thad Scholes. Affirmative vote was unanimous.

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PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

1. Associated College of Southern Idaho Student Body President A.J. Buhler and Vice President Victoria Field spoke to the Board concerning Education Week. They outlined planned activities for each day of the week.

President Buhler reviewed the Senate goals and objectives for the 1999-2000 school year and answered questions from the Board. The President and Chairman Lehrman commended the students for their work.

2. President Meyerhoeffer reviewed the history of the use of CSI vans by both the community and the college. Shawn Barigar spoke on behalf of the Boys and Girls Club and requested occasional use of the vans. Dr. Scholes recommended we consider eliminating van use for organizations that are not directly affiliated with CSI.

College Attorney Robert Alexander indicated that he would work on a van use policy. This policy will define what constitutes a CSI related activity and a college related program.

The van policy will be discussed at the next $\ensuremath{\mathtt{Board}}$ meeting.

- 3. Barbara Knudson reviewed the College's Y2K plans. She commended Doug Maughan for facilitating a community discussion on Y2K. She also indicated that the Y2K committee is working on identifying staff and students who may be impacted by problems associated with Y2K.
- 4. Randy Dill reviewed the options for replacing bridges across the Perine Coulee and Lateral 41 in the middle of campus. After a discussion by the Board, Bill Babcock moved that the Lateral 41 bridge be replaced with a culvert and the Perine Coulee Bridge be replaced with a culvert or other suitable crossing. The MOTION also stipulated that gates be installed with signs limiting the use of the bridge to employees only. The MOTION passed by a unanimous vote.

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- 5. The President advised the Board that the Idaho State Board of Education rated our Fine Arts Addition as the number three priority.
- 6. The President also advised the Board that the Idaho State Board of Education would be meeting on our campus on October 21, 1999. The College will host a dinner for the Board at the Herrett Center.
- 7. Dr. Charles Lehrman reported on his trip to the annual convention of the Association of Community College Trustees. He reported on presentations on crime awareness and critical incident management. Dr. Lehrman in forwarding information to the administration concerning campus security.

The President indicated that the college is looking at some remote camera systems and improved campus lighting.

8. The President advised the Board of a change in the Federal Privacy Act concerning information a college can give to a parent. The college can now inform parents of student drug and alcohol problems.

The college will review its policy in this area.

The Hardware Problem

The most common PC year 2000 hardware problem is a failure to transition from 31-Dec-1999 to 1-Jan-2000 successfully. The other less common but critical hardware failure type is the failure to accept and operate successfully in the year 2000.

All PCs run a Basic Input/Output System (BIOS) program hard-wired into the computer before any operating system or other programs are started. The BIOS is designed to initialize the PC so that it pecomes aware of its hardware configuration, such as hard and floppy drives, video and keyboard parameters. It also sets up the system date and time by reading values from the real time clock chip, which is battery-powered (rechargeable) to keep a constant time reference for the PC.

Most PC BIOS programs have four digits allocated for recording the year (1997), but most only change the last two digits (97).

The majority of PCs tested have failed the basic rollover test.

Many programs read their internal dates from the operating system date which reads from the BIOS, or from the BIOS directly. A non-compliant BIOS will result in the program being fed with incorrect dates, which is particularly dangerous for accounting, spreadsheet, inventory, and payroll.

Every Single PC Can Be Different

It's not uncommon to find two PCs from the same manufacturer, bought on the same day, that run different BIOS versions.

This BIOS date rollover problem is an issue simply because programs are dependent on being fed the correct date by the BIOS. If they receive incorrect date information your normal working procedures will be seriously disrupted.

91% of BIOSs in computers manufactured during and before 1996 do not rollover successfully to 2000. 47% of BIOSs created in 1997 do not rollover successfully to 2000!
